This is believed to be the first call to an openly gay pastor by a local church.












Bill Silver (1947-2007), at Detroit General Assembly, 1980. Bill was the first openly gay candidate for ordination in the UPCUSA, 1975, and an early officer of the Presbyterian Gay Caucus, 1977.

Chris Glaser, at the Detroit GA, 1980. He was the openly gay member of the GA Task Force on Homosexuality, 1976-78, an early officer of the Presbyterian Gay Caucus, 1977, and the first director of the Lazarus Project at West Hollywood Presbyterian Church, 1977-1987.




Thus, Barry Smith and David Sindt were both nominated for the Session. David, being openly gay, was not elected; Barry, staying silent, was elected.

In 1982, Barry was re-elected, this time as openly gay, and after 15 months of church judicial action was installed to Session, 1984.


























