

Intersectionality: A Call to Reconciliation

That All May Freely Serve 2017: Beginning the Next Quarter Century

Steadfast resistance to the marginalization of our Queer Community in the PC(USA) informs the future mission of That All May Freely Serve, as it has our past.

Our Queer and Supportive Community is called upon to lead in reconciliation. We are called to insist on a church that assures the future world's hope for an intersectionality that aspires to peace and love for all of the human family.

While intersectionality sets the future stage, our lives together exist in the present. Along with initiatives for reconciliation in the church, our first call is to those among us. That All May Freely Serve is actively engaged in providing pastoral care and support for advocacy, either directly or by indirectly networking outreach through others. For example:

- We provide pastoral care through our grass roots network, making sure that those who are in need - have someone to speak with and assist them in their geographical location.
- Through our outreach, one of our friends provides "Meals on Wheels" to a member of our community who is in a challenging time of their life. (Representing a monthly contribution of \$150.)
- We support small and emerging queer advocacy groups within our church, including *Not So Churchy*.
- We work with Trans-leadership in the Northeast, especially, in supporting upcoming gatherings of Transgender Day of Remembrance (TDOR).
- We use our budget, as available, to fund travel for evangelists.
- We are on the steering committee for the Janie Spahr Initiative at San Francisco Theological Seminary.
- Through the JSI, we hope to offer an amendment for the 223rd General Assembly to revisit the call of the PC(USA) to acknowledge the harms it has done to our Queer Community as a step toward reconciliation.
- We serve on the steering committee for "Rolling the Stone Away" - a major gathering of Queer leadership across denomination and generations to be held in Kansas City in October, 2017.

Additionally, we maintain our website, Twitter and Facebook accounts for That All May Freely Serve, using social media to communicate and be engaged with our grass roots communities around the country.

In 2016, we reached our goal of having an all volunteer organization, with no administrative or staff expense. As a result, 100% of donations go to the support of outreach.

That All May Freely Serve continues its mission in the ways described, while listening for how it may be called and led in the future. The support of congregations, such as First Presbyterian Church of San Rafael, are very important to us. Even more important are your prayers and the work you do in your own community for those who God places on your path. Together, we serve. In all the ways that occur, and we are most grateful and thankful to share this ministry with you.
